
Liverpool Irish Heritage Walking Tours - Scotland Road



Liverpool Irish Festival and The Capstone Theatre present this World Premiere performance of an innovative new composition, The Speech Project.

Four years in the making, The Speech Project is a ground-breaking collection of new musical works by musician, composer and producer Gerry Diver.

Inspired by and incorporating recordings of the spoken word of seminal Irish folk musicians including Christy Moore, Damien Dempsey, Paddy Moloney of The Chieftains, Joe Cooley, Danny Meehan and more.

He extracted key phrases from the recordings, and taking the rhythm, pitch and phrasing as inspiration, Gerry began to compose a series of works that are uniquely lrish astonishing in concept

The show will feature musicians including Gerry Diver, himself, with special guest Lisa Knapp, and specially commissioned accompanying videos for selected works.

They interact amazingly with the spoken word recordings of the Irish musicians used in the Speech Project recordings.

When the world premiere was proposed for LIF 2011, Gerry flew to Dublin to meet with featured artist Damien Dempsey and recorded their conversation. This may lead to a new work as part of the Speech Project at the Festival.

Last year's inaugural Irish Sea Sessions saw a group of 14 artists from many different musical traditions including punk, folk roots and pop, come together in a triumphant concert at Liverpool Philharmonic as a key part of the Liverpool Irish Festival 2010, the show was voted 'Best Folk/Roots Event of the Year' by Liverpool Daily Post readers.

The Informer

John Ford's The Informer is based on the controversial novel published by Liam O'Flaherty in 1925. Set in the aftermath of the political upheavals in Ireland in the early twentieth century, it tells the story of a disaffected member of the IRA who betrays one of his former comrades for a bounty of £20.

The Informer is clearly the work of a master film-maker in the offing, winning four Academy Awards, including the first of Ford's four Oscars for Best Director.



Ulysses

Independent American film-maker Joseph Strick attempted what many people consider to be the impossible with this adaptation of James Joyce's infamous novel Ulysses.

Set in Dublin over the course of a single day (June 16th 1904), Ulysses tells the interlocking stories of the young teacher and would-be writer Stephen Dedalus, the middle-aged advertising canvasser Leopold Bloom, and the latter's wife Molly. Betrayal – personal and political – stalks them throughout the day, and yet Joyce's vision of modern life remains essentially comic and optimistic.


