

Ciaran Lavery and Ryan Vail perform their project album 'Sea Legs' in a one-off Liverpool performance for the opening of Liverpool Irish Festival. Two artists from very different worlds; Ciaran is a young alt-folk singer from Aghagallon who has racked up an impressive 11 million plays on Spotify while Ryan Vail is a minimal electronic artist who creates widescreen soundscapes with piano, synthesiser and sampled found sound. The artists have come together to create a beautiful experimental piece inspired by maritime life and the coastal surroundings of Donegal, where they recorded the album.

Featuring Ciaran's wistful vocals, spoken word from an Irish poet, Boston and Donegal fishermen, sea gulls, the wind and the sea, the album and live performances are rich and enchanting. 'Sea Legs' takes its listeners on a windswept journey, artfully crafted to a quiet timelessness.

After spontaneously releasing the 'We, I' EP in late 2012 with no prior recordings or gigs, a storm of critical interest quickly followed. Following the 2014 eponymous EP Callum will be performing new material.



Glenn Patterson is the author of nine novels, the most recent of which is *The Rest Just Follows*. *The Mill for Grinding Old People Young (2012)* was Belfast's first One City One Book choice. *Here's Me Here*, a collection featuring his articles and essays for print and broadcast has just been published by New Island, who previously published the collection Lapsed Protestant. A new novel new novel, *Gull*, will appear in January next year.

His work for radio includes the plays *DeLorean* (Radio 4, 2011) and *Babble* (Radio 3, 2006) and his first feature film *Good Vibrations* (co-written with Colin Carberry) was released in 2013 to critical acclaim, won several film awards and received a BAFTA nomination. He has presented numerous television documentaries and an arts review series for RTE.


